

DRUMTHWACKET

PRINCETON, MERCER COUNTY, NEW JERSEY



Drumthwacket, which means “wooded hill” in Scottish Gaelic, was constructed in 1835 by Charles Smith Olden, a businessman and president of Princeton University who was elected Governor of New Jersey in 1860. The home was expanded by subsequent owner Moses Taylor Pyne, who also added hundreds of acres to create a park-like landscape. Since the 1980s, Drumthwacket has served as the official residence of New Jersey’s Governor and is also used for special events and tours.



- Services: Design, Contract Documents, Bidding and Contract Administration.
