

The Squan Beach Life-Saving Station in Manasquan is one of approximately 42 lifesaving stations that were situated three and a half miles apart between Sandy Hook and Cape May in the early-20th century. The station was constructed in 1903 in the Duluth style, which was the most popular architectural style for stations in this area. Today, it is one of a few stations that have survived along New Jersey's Atlantic Coastline and retains historical and architectural significance.
